# **Mission Service Team**

# Possible Work Projects 2022

At the Upper Sand Mountain Parish, Mission Service Teams are groups of youth, adults, or families who volunteer time, skills, and resources. Youth teams should have one adult leader or chaperon for every 6-8 youth. Teams should plan to divide into work groups of 6-8 persons for different projects during the day. Mission Service Teams may serve for a day, several days, or a week long experience.

Possible projects for Mission Service Teams fall into the following areas (depending on seasons):

### 1. Repairing Low-Income Houses

One important focus for Mission Service Teams is home repairs for low and fixed income families. Projects may include minor repairs such as painting, repairing windows and porches, replacing roofing and floors, and other home repairs. We also work to ensure any homes needing handicap accessibility are taken care of. During fall, weatherization of homes is important.

### 2. Maintaining and constructing Parish and church facilities

This includes projects such as painting, yard work and improving facilities at the Parish Ministry Center or projects at our member Parish churches.

### 3. Canning and Preserving Food at the Better Way Cannery

An important part of the gleaning process is preserving food for distribution during seasons when no fresh vegetables are available. Working with local leaders, Mission Service Teams will help prepare jars and food for canning and learn food preservation skills to help feed the hungry. This food will be distributed through the Parish food pantry and through other soup kitchens and food pantries in North Alabama. Homemade jams and jellies are also prepared in our cannery to support Parish ministries.

### 4. Day Camps or VBS for Area Children (Weekends or regular school breaks)

This weekly program provides outdoor fun time that includes recreation, stories, crafts, music, and food for community children living locally in low-income areas. More information and planning for this will arrive with your packet 3 months prior to arrival.

# A Covenant for Success

We are blessed to have the opportunity to serve God by being volunteers in missions. Our primary focus as volunteers is to show the love of Jesus Christ to all we encounter, as we invest ourselves in the mission work we come to do. We will need to be patient, flexible, adaptable, and understanding. There will be times when things do not go as planned. Delays may happen and we will need to make the best we can of that situation. Cooperation is the key! We will face the need to cooperate with many, varied people and conditions during our time in service. So remember that a positive attitude will go a long way, especially on hot, muggy days. Remember to smile, even in difficult times, as we work to relieve the suffering of those around us.

#### **Team Guidelines:**

- No alcohol, drugs or other illegal substances.
- No knives, chains, or other items that may typically be used as a weapon.
- Refer any changes, suggestions or concerns to your leader. Don't make independent decisions, as they can affect other people.
- Work to acceptable standards. Do the best you can!
- Ask questions if you don't know what to do or how to do it. Remember questions and answers are a part of good stewardship.
- Don't assume you know the entire plan of things. Ask before you do anything in addition to what you have been instructed to do.
- Wear modest clothing- shoulders covered, fitting shorts that are long enough, and sensible and safe shoes.
- Use sunscreen lotion during your outside work and play.
- Foul or undesirable language is not permitted.
- Keep workspace and living space sanitary, safe, and secure.
- Don't criticize, gossip, or start rumors.
- Have fun while you are here and spread God's love with cheer!

## Leadership and Planning

Teams at the Upper Sand Mountain Parish are self- sustaining with support of a Parish staff member for project work. Your team will be responsible for leadership during the day and for evening programs. Each team participating in home repairs needs to include a person skilled in carpentry and construction techniques.

We hope that your team will be intentional in planning daily reflections, morning devotions, and evening programs during the week. Topics may include: Identification of Personal Gifts for Ministry; the Theology of Service; Caring for the Least of God's Children; Appalachian Culture and History; Team Building; Global Missions; Stewardship and the Environment; Justice and Peace; and Conflict Resolution.

Pastor Woody, our Executive Director, will be happy to come to your church, school or organization and make a presentation on behalf of the Parish to help in the planning phase of your trip. Parish staff will provide orientation to the Parish and its year round ministries upon arrival.

### Housing and Meals

Mission Service Teams have different housing options depending on the size and preference of each group. Holland's Chapel, which is a church building that has been converted into a bunkhouse, is a popular option for groups of 22 or fewer. Holland's chapel has a full kitchen, restroom and shower facilities, washer and dryer, and a common area for group devotion and discussion times. Larger groups generally stay at one or multiple of the Parish member churches. The Mission Service Teams should bring sleeping bags and/or bedding for twin-sized mattresses that the Parish provides for groups up to 30 persons in size. Groups larger than 30, or anyone who would prefer to bring their own air mattress to sleep on is certainly welcome to do so.

Teams will be responsible for their own meals but there are meals throughout the week that will be offered for your group by Parish Member Churches and prior to Thursday Evening's worship at Scottsboro FUMC. Your itinerary and meals being offered will be planned with the help of Parish staff prior to your arrival based on your dates and duration of stay. Because of the distance between work sites, we suggest brown bag lunches during working days. In some cases, it is possible to meet at a central location for lunch together. Supermarkets are available in the area to purchase needed food items during your stay. If arriving after 5:00 p.m. on Sundays, it is recommended that you purchase food for Monday breakfast and lunch before settling in for the night.

### Transportation

Teams are responsible for their own transportation during your stay on Sand Mountain. Because of the distance between work sites and the need for transporting materials to work sites, we suggest that you plan for at least one vehicle for every two working groups. Vans or large SUVs are recommended for transportation purposes.

#### Insurance

Mission Service Teams are responsible for liability and medical insurance for the team as a whole and also for individual members. We suggest that each team obtain medical information along with release forms for members 18 years old and under. In case of an emergency this would prove to be helpful. United Methodist Mission Service Teams may obtain Liability and Medical Insurance coverage, in most cases, through your Conference office.

# Schedule

This is the basic schedule for the week from Monday to Friday.

Please know that we encourage teams to experience an "off" day while you are here. Traveling to Huntsville or Chattanooga also offers many unique opportunities.

The Upper Sand Mountain Parish is flexible in scheduling Mission Service Teams. We try to meet your expectations and needs. We have also partnered with the Little River Canyon National Park for a day (usually Wednesday) of education, sightseeing, and environmental mission project work.

# Mental and Spiritual Preparation for the Mission Service Team Experience

It is helpful for groups to begin preparing for mission work well in advance. The ideal time to begin to prepare for a service project is several months before your anticipated arrival. After you determine that your group is ready to do mission work, please consider the following suggestions. Keep in mind that every group is different and some of these ideas may not pertain to your situation.

- Designate a leader/co-leaders/coordinator. Different groups do this different ways. Some choose (one) leader, some choose different people to be in charge of different aspects of the trip (i.e. food, worship, recreation, tools, transportation).
- Set your Mission Service Team preparation time apart from UMYF, Sunday School class, and regular church meeting times. Your Mission Service Team will have its own focus.
- Have your group meet on a regular basis to keep everyone updated, do group building activities, talk about fundraising efforts, etc.
- Set group guidelines for participation in your Mission Service Team (i.e. attendance at meetings, participation in fundraising).
- Have an application form for people on your team to complete. Once these have been turned in, have the group create a covenant to be signed by the participants. This will help everyone identify their strengths and their personal reasons for wanting to be involved in such an endeavor. It will also help you to identify the expectations of the group and will help to solidify everyone's commitment to the trip.

- Hold training sessions to learn certain skills before the trip (i.e. basic carpentry or plumbing; painting techniques such as scraping, using a brush or a roller).
- Invite a speaker who has been on a mission trip before. Invite someone who can address issues such as the effects of poverty and what the Christian response can be to poverty.
- Work with a group in your area doing urban ministries, a Cooperative Parish or Habitat for Humanity, on weekends.
- Do workday projects for people in your community or a maintenance day at your church.
- Work on team building and group dynamics. It helps to have already worked to break the ice before you depart for Sand Mountain.
- Be intentional about involving all members of your group. Divide the responsibilities because everyone can make a contribution.

# Questions to Consider

Have individuals or small groups consider these questions and report back to the larger group:

- 1. How many or how much of the following do you own or receive?
  - a. Pairs or shoes
  - b. CD's/ DVDs
  - c. Electronic devices (cell phones, I-pods, etc.)
  - d. Spending money per week
  - e. New clothes
- 2. How many close friends do you have who do not have a lot or any of the above items?
- 3. How many people that attend your church can you identify as "poor" or on welfare?
- 4. When repairs need to be made at your house, who does the work? Why?
- 5. What significance do you think the above questions will have on your Mission Service Team experience?
- 6. What experiences have you had in relating to people who have a different culture from your own?
- 7. Why do you want to participate in this mission trip?
- 8. What do you hope to accomplish by being a member of this Mission Service Team?

After this exercise and sharing time, come together as a group and compose a Mission Statement that describes who you are, what your purpose is and the goals you wish to accomplish together. It may be helpful to look at the United Methodist Mission and Ministry section in the Book of Discipline. Your pastor should have a copy.

It may also be helpful to talk about some of the realities of mission work, such as:

- It may be hot or rainy
- You will be doing hard physical work
- You will be living in conditions different from home (i.e. little privacy, shared living and shower space)
- The houses you work on may be dirty, falling down, smelly
- The people you ware working with may not take care of their homes and themselves in the same way your family does

How do you think Jesus would respond in these situations? How does God call us to respond to these situations? How can we be the Body of Christ in today's world?
